Campus Security Act of 1990

A campus safety plan shall be developed, maintained, and available to students, employees, and the general public through the District's website and at each college campus.

The plan shall include and describe the following:

- The availability and location of campus security personnel
- Methods for summoning assistance of security personnel
- Special safeguards that have been established for particular facilities or activities

The Chief Student Services Officer (CSSO) or designee prepares and annually updates a report of all occurrences reported to the campus security officer or college police officer of, and arrests for, crimes that are committed on campus and that involve:

- violence;
- hate violence;
- theft or destruction of property;
- illegal drugs or alcohol intoxication; and
- all occurrences of noncriminal acts of hate violence reported to campus authorities.

The report shall be available student, employees, and the general public through the District's website and at each college campus.

Written records of noncriminal acts of hate violence shall include at least a description of the act of hate violence, the victim characteristics, and offender characteristics, if known.

"Hate violence" is defined in Education Code as any act of intimidation or physical harassment, physical force or physical violence, or the threat of physical force or physical violence, that is directed against any person or group of persons or the property of any person or group of persons because of the ethnicity, race, national origin, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, disability, or political or religious beliefs of that person or group.

Education Code requires reporting of occurrences reported to the campus security officer or college police and arrests for crimes that involve hate violence and non-criminal acts of hate violence.

For purposes of reporting under the Clery Act, "hate crimes" include domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking.
